
Introduction & Welcome

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Key Terms



JCR

The Junior Common Room is a charity dedicated to Cuth's students, run by Cuth's students. The JCR includes Cuth's sports, societies, events, outreach and student-led welfare amongst much more.

Postgraduate and Mature Students' Committee oversees events aimed at Postgrad students at Cuth's. You may see that other colleges have a MCR (Middle Common Room). While we do not have a separate MCR for Postgrads at Cuth's, the PGM Committee plays the same role.



This is the payment you make for your JCR membership. If you have previously studied in Cuth's and this is your 4th year, membership is free. If you are a PhD student, you only need to pay the levy once and this will cover your whole PhD.

The larger of the two Cuth's sites which is made up Refounder's House, Brooks House, Fonteyn Court and Parson's Field Court (PFC). The Postgraduate accommodation in Cuth's is located in Brooks House. It is also the location of some of social spaces, gyms and one of the bars.

They represent and support students across all colleges. They can be found in Dunelm House on New Elvet, next to Kingsgate Bridge.



Cuth's JCR



Cuth's JCR (Junior Common Room) is the student body of Cuth's. The JCR runs and is responsible for our social events, sports, societies, welfare support, volunteering opportunities, facilities and representing the views of Cuth's Students. The JCR has an Executive Committee which I sit on as the PGM Pres. The Exec is led by our President and has a range of representatives from across the JCR. We also have a wide array of committees and positions available for students to get involved in, ranging from Welfare Committee to Governance Committee.

There's plenty of opportunities to get involved with something you're passionate about (I'll talk about our committees, sports and societies later in the handbook). If you want to get involved a great way to see what Cuth's is about is our JCR Meetings. They happen at least three times a term in either of our bars or the dining hall on the bailey. In the meetings any member of the JCR can run motions, which may involve the creation of new societies, new positions or changing something about how the JCR currently operates. Meetings also involve hustings for the JCR positions open for election.



Cuth's JCR & College

Cuth's JCR, unlike some of the other JCR's at Durham, is an independent charity which means we are completely run by students. The college part of Cuth's however is made up of staff including our Principal, Vice Principal, Student Support, porters, cleaners, secretaries and catering staff. The JCR and college work together to make Cuth's what it is, but have distinctive roles.

It can be confusing to know who to email about certain things. If you have queries about accommodation, academic matters, student support, etc please get in touch in with a member of college staff. With matters regarding events, welfare, sports & socs, gyms, library it tends to be best to get in touch with a representative of the JCR. Of course, if you have any issues and don't know who the right person is to contact feel free to email me and I can direct you.

Often people new to Durham will ask why Cuth's is a society rather than a college. In our history Cuth's was established in 1888 by people who did not want the same college life as the other existing colleges (Castle and Hatfield). The college consisted of people who lived out

and were often mature. Today, we in the operate same way as the other colleges but remain proud of history our and like pride to ourselves of our independence.

Postgraduate and Mature Students' Committee



The Postgraduate and Mature Students' Committee (PGM Comm) organises events and ensures that the voice of Postgraduate and Mature Students are heard in the JCR. In Cuth's it operates as the equivalent of an MCR which exist in most of the other colleges in Durham. PGM Comm will organise events which are aimed at you specifically as Postgrad and Mature Students, however by having a joint common all the events, sports, societies, and opportunities that the wider JCR organise are also open to you. It's completely up to you about how much or how little you get involved, but I would encourage you to have a look at everything that is on offer for you.

Role on PGM Comm: I'm Ben, the President of the Society which means that I sit on all of the Committees in the JCR, including PGM Comm! My role is to provide some guidance to the committee, especially about working with College and the wider community. I also make sure that all the work we do is linked up with others, including ensuring that other committees and Exec members are aware of plans, so that we can cooperate and work together as needed. I'm also there just to help out generally with the committee's activities!

Your favourite thing about Cuth's: My favourite thing about Cuth's is that we as a JCR have so much autonomy from College and the University, and are so student-led. For example, we're the only College where student volunteers working on behalf of the JCR run the library.






SCR

PGM Events throughout the Year

Social Events

Postgrad Committee organises a number of casual social events throughout the year. These include meals out, nights in brooks bar, bar crawls, quizzes and going out for coffee.

Academic Events

Our Academic Rep will organise a couple of Research Forums each term. At these events a couple of people will speak about their research interests. This usually involves members of the SCR, postgrads and final year undergrads. We also have Research Slams which are an informal research forum which allows people who haven't finished their research to get casual feedback on their work.

Inter-MCR Formals

MCR Formals occur across Durham colleges and are open to anyone from another MCR, or equivalent, so for Cuth's this any Postgrad, Mature Student or a Fourth Year Student. Most of formals will have a theme; we've had a murder mystery formal for the last couple of years which has proven to be very popular.

Formals

Formals are held in Cuth's Dining Hall and often have a theme (ie. Burns Night). The dress code will either be Lounge Suit or Black Tie. Lounge suit means a regular suit and tie, a jacket, smart shirt and tie, a dress or most outfits as long as they're smart are fine. Black tie is a bit fancier - some people will wear Dinner Jackets, dress shirt and a bow tie, cocktail dresses or trousers and a blouse. Variations on this are welcome.

Big Events

Social Comm organise a number of big events throughout the year. This includes Balls held at external venues where there will be a three-course meal followed by entertainment for the rest of the evening which may include food vans, fairground rides, mini golf, etc.

The Feast of St Cuthbert happens every epiphany term and is held in college. It involves a three course meal followed by entertainment and culminates in a silent disco in our dining hall.

The final big event of the year is Cuth's Day where there is live music throughout the day in Cuth's gardens alongside a variety of other activities.

There are also other smaller scale events held throughout the year.





JCR Facilities



Cuth's Library

Cuth's Library is located in House 8 on the Bailey; it is easily identifiable with its lion head door knocker.



The library is a great place to work, if the Bill Bryson Library isn't your cup of tea. Speaking of, the library has tea, coffee and biscuits readily available for those of who work there. You can also order any book you want to Cuth's library, so if there is something you would like to read, either something for academic purposes or a novel, keep an eye for book orders at the beginning of the term. You can also volunteer to work at the library so keep an eye out for more information if you're interested.

Bailey and Brooks Bar

At Cuth's we like to pride ourselves in our unique qualities, and one of them is that we have two bars. The Bailey Bar is located in House 12 and Brooks Bar is located Brooks House on the Parsons Field site. Throughout the year social events will be hosted at both bars including Karaoke nights, acoustic nights, Cuth's does Eurovision and JCR meetings.



The Bailey Bar is one of the social centres of Cuth's and has a great atmosphere to hang out in and for socials. It definitely has the traditional pub feel about it, especially on a busy night.

Brooks Bar is a more of a casual place to hang out. It's a great place for some drinks with groups of friends, and for those of you who are living in Brooks, very convenient as it's only a walk down stairs for you. Brooks is also a good place to work during the day.

Gyms

We have a cardio gym and weights in gym both at the Parson's Field. In order to use either of the gyms you need to do a gym induction which will be advertised at the start of term. Gym membership is included in the JCR Levy.

Junior Common Rooms

As well as the 'JCR' referring to the student body of Cuth's, there are also two social spaces with one on the Bailey and one at Parson's field where you can hang out with fellow students. They also have spaces for study.

Kyle-Langley Music Room

Cuth's music room is located in Fonteyn Court at Parson's Field. It is sound proof and has a number of musical instruments and equipment in the room. The room can be booked out for practice.

Computer Rooms

There are also computer rooms so you can access any subject specific software that you will need for your course or work in college without lugging round your laptop

Sports & Societies



We have a large range of Sports and Societies ranging from Football to Crochet. We have a Sports and Societies Chair who oversees them all so to keep up to date with them make sure you follow @TeamCuths on Instagram. The JCR levy allows the JCR to subsidies subs (essentially the membership) which means it is cheaper for you to join.

If you're passionate about something we don't currently have a society for, you can make one. Get in touch with Ben our Sports and Socs Chair and he can help you set it up. You'll need to get 15 people to say there are interested and take it to a JCR meeting.

There is a Sports & Socs Fair on the afternoon of Saturday 30th September which will be held on the Bailey. I would recommend going to have a look around and seeing what is on offer.

Hi, I'm Freddy, and I'm your new Postgraduate Academic Officer here at the Durham Students' Union. I'd like to take this time to, first of all, welcome you to Durham University! I'd also like to just give a quick introduction, explain who I am, what my role is, and how best you can make use of the SU and its resources during your time here at Durham.



As previously mentioned, my name's Freddy and I was a history student at Durham both as an Undergraduate and Postgraduate before I took up the role of Postgraduate Academic Officer at Durham's SU. The SU is a registered charity existing specifically to advocate for the interests of students, both here at Durham and naturally. As the PG Academic Officer, I am the only Officer at the SU specifically representing Postgraduate Students, both taught and research, and it is my job in this role to campaign on University-wide issues affecting Postgrads. This includes, but is not limited to, issues regarding the quality of supervision, the treatment of Postgrads with teaching and marking responsibilities, and the calibre and accessibility of support resources. More than merely this, it is also my job to directly represent you at a number of high-level University committees.

Naturally, my ability to do my job as effectively as possible relies on your please feel free feedback. SO to contact me at supgacademic@durham.ac.uk with any concerns you have regarding your academic experience while at Durham or with any work the SU is engaging in more broadly. This does not mean, however, that my remit is solely academic. Library & Study Spaces

Study Spaces

We have already mentioned the main university Library (Bill Bryson Library) and Cuth's Library, but there are a wide variety of study spaces across the university. For students popular study spaces include the Teaching and Learning Centre (located across the road from the science site), Dunelm House (The SU building) and Palace Green Library. There are also some study spaces which are only for Postgraduate Students and it is worth asking your department whether they offer desks to students (especially if you're a PGR) or have specific study spaces/libraries for students in their departments. There are also a number of smaller study spaces across Cuth's and if you prefer to work in cafes you have so many to choose from in Durham.

Borrowing Books

Taught postgraduates can borrow up to 30 items – standard loan is 3 months Research postgraduates can borrow 40 items - standard loans of 6 months

If a book you require is not owned by Durham University library, you can make a request to borrow it from another library through the Inter-Library Loan system.

Printing

Areas of Durham

Claypath is basically the leading street up to from the Gilesgate Marketplace. It's literally a stone's throw from the City Centre and home to the Theatre. Gala This is particularly handy therefore for cinema goers. There a number of late night food places on this street as well as a smaller Tescos than in Market Square.

Gilesgate is one of the more residential areas of Durham, located at the top of Claypath. There is a Sainsburys up there and it



is also not a far walk to 'Big Tescos' which is also right next to a lot of other shops including Iceland, Home Bargains, Aldi, etc.

Neville's Cross A little further out, but there are some smaller shops and takeaways there. More of a residential area and not as many students living there than the Viaduct.

The Viaduct Accessible via North Road or Crossgate. The Viaduct is dominated by student housing. North Road provides close proximity to shops including Tescos Express and Iceland. It is also very close to both the train station and bus station so perfect for accessing public transport.

Cuth's Welfare provide support for all students in Cuth's whether a first year undergraduate, mature student or a Postgrad. We have four Welfare Officers in Cuth's who will hold drop in hours each week. Our minority reps will also be holding some drop ins this year. The wider welfare team will be running campaigns throughout the year. Welfare also provides free contraceptives and pregnancy tests upon request.

The History of St Cuthbert Society



St Cuthbert Society was founded in 1888 as a non-residential community for mature and local students who did not want to live in the two existing colleges which were Hatfield and University College (Castle). Cuth's therefore was established as society which distinguished it from the other two societies. Rather than a Principal, we had a Censor, who was a member of University staff, to oversee Cuth's.

Initially, Cuth's did not have any space of its own, and its students reportedly spent a great deal of time monopolising the chairs by the Union Society fire, much to the annoyance of others. The situation came to a head in 1892, when the St Cuthbert's Men were having difficulty finding a place to hold their meetings. After a collective letter to the Journal outlining their grievances, they were granted access to St Cuthbert's Room in University House, now Cosin's Hall, on Palace Green. It became home to St Cuthbert's for over fifty years.

After the Second World War, in 1946, the St Cuthbert's Society was 're-founded' and the University appointed the first Principal, a member of academic staff, to manage the community. In 1947 St Cuthbert's was allocated a room on Owengate, beside the Castle, along with 30 Church Street, so that it could offer its members more space to meet. But with over 200 students belonging to Cuth's, it was still impossible to entertain everyone in the new premises.

It was not until 1951 that St Cuthbert's Society settled at 12 South Bailey, which still serves as its administrative headquarters. Originally, 12 South Bailey contained the Principal's Office, a Junior Common Room, the first ever Senior Common Room, and accommodation for six students. The rest continued to live in houses in the local community. This was the first time that members of St Cuthbert's had ever had accommodation on University premises, and it was in high demand. More accommodation was acquired on the Bailey over the next thirty years, and most recently at Parson's Field on Old Elvet. The college now comprises approximately 1,300 students.

Today, St Cuthbert's Society still retains the independence of spirit that was the hallmark of its founders, but is able to offer its students all the advantages associated with being a college of Durham University. In 2008, the University agreed to allow Cuth's to retain the title 'Society' as a reflection of its heritage.

Our coat of arms features the shield of St. Cuthbert in the centre. Above it is an eider duck, while St. Cuthbert was living on the Farne Islands he instituted special laws to protect the birds nesting there. The ducks have since been known as cuddy ducks.
